

Message from our Principal, Mrs Bridget Davidson

Tēnā koutou katoa and warm greetings to each and every one of you.

On Monday, we featured in the New Zealand Herald, our country's national newspaper – who wanted to know our 'secret sauce' for achieving our excellent NCEA Level 3 results. They analysed the 2023 national results and Otago Girls' came out among the best. In response I explained that we had highly specialised and passionate teachers, high co-curricular involvement and great inspiration in our alumni. For example, former Dux Lucy Matehaere represented New Zealand in Sprint kayaking at the Paris Olympics this year.

Last week we also made the Crimson List of the Top 50 Schools in New Zealand for gaining entrance to the World's Top Universities - this based on 70% academic performance, 15% co-curricular and 15% access and diversity. This recognises us as a leading academic school in New Zealand.



This year, ex-girl Mai Chen, a top Public Law expert in New Zealand, has introduced a Transformational Leadership Prize of \$2000 recognising students who are able to collaborate, influence and lead meaningful change. This year Mai decided to award two prizes and first recipients of this prize were Rata Williams and Rosie Falcous.



School leadership is also very strong and we are delighted to announce that our new Academic and Global Prefect for 2025 is Alison Han. Other student leadership initiatives include the Year 13 Peer Support Camp at Warrington, the tuakana-teina 'Sisters' programme and the 2T High Performance programme. Fun and engaging lunchtime activities, music and evening events have further enriched this leadership, alongside our shared OBHS activities such as 'Friends First'.

I would like to thank Mrs Rose Gilani - Director of International Students and Mrs Katherine Boomer - Dean of International Students for their amazing work and support of students this year. The Department of International Students is thriving and growing under their guidance.

I will leave you with a quote from Otago Girls ex-student, Jenny Armstrong, former Olympic Gold Medallist sailor and parent here at our school:






Message from our Director of International Students, **Mrs Rose Gilani**

In the remaining weeks of classes, the students completed some presentations for their English Language presenting standards and I am very proud of how well they can present to a group in another language with only a few words on their cards. There were some magnificent visual aids made to go with the talks.

Once the exam leave started, the juniors had exams in their subjects and the senior international students who were not doing NCEA or had few exams, joined the international program. We ventured out and didn't let the weather change our plans to explore some of the beautiful locations we have near Dunedin. The day we went out on the Otago Peninsula to visit the Royal Albatross Colony and Larnach Castle was a most spectacular day. Otago Harbour was calm and there were hardly any clouds in the sky. That fine weather meant there weren't any flying albatrosses to see but it did make for a beautiful afternoon at Larnach Castle, sitting on the lawn eating scones and macarons.




and fun. Hanne and Antonia had their birthdays at the beach, something they wouldn't be able to do in Germany at this time of the year.


Josie Menzel




Mion Degawa

Nationality: Japan



Nationality: German



I am an outdoorsy girl, which means I really like to do things in nature including hiking, surfing,




photography or similar things. Hi everyone, my name is Ada. Today I am going to talk about hiking.
